



Sestriere is one of the world's first purpose-built resorts, constructed in the 1930s. The resort has a modern and trendy feel to it, with a lively après ski scene amongst the town's popular bars and restaurants. As one of Italy's highest ski resorts, Sestriere offers reliable snow conditions and glorious skiing for all abilities. With more than 400km of piste and access to the Milky Way ski area, this resort is a popular choice for keen skiers and snowboarders alike.

Top Runs

- There is an array of steep terrain for expert skiers spread over the Milky Way ski area. Sestriere's well-connected trails means there are plenty of black slopes, as well as lots of heliskiing opportunities.
- For intermediates, there is a large selection of red runs spread through the resort and across the rest of the Milky Way ski area.
- Beginners have a range of nursery slopes to practice on, as well as more challenging runs further up the mountain for building ski confidence.



Best for Après Ski

- **I.GLOO**
This popular spot has a large underground bar area and a fantastic roof terrace for the ultimate après ski experience. I.GLOO is famed for its extensive cocktail menu.
- **Kovo**
A great place to grab some food and cocktails after a day on the slopes. There are themed nights and a lively atmosphere that lasts until the early hours.
- **QB**
Based at the foot of the slopes, this bar is a stylish spot to grab a post-ski drink. There is a good selection of wines and they regularly host live music and DJ sets.

Recommended Restaurants

- **Last Tango**
One of the oldest food vendors in Sestriere, offering a hearty lunch or dinner to hungry skiers. Last Tango is famed for its meat dishes served fresh off the grill. It also caters to vegetarians.
- **Le Bistrot**
This traditional Italian restaurant overlooks the slopes and is known for serving homemade food and speciality pizza all day long.
- **Chalet Raggio di Sole**
A mountain restaurant with a great atmosphere and an a la carte menu. Don't miss their renowned homemade cakes!
